Thank you for your interest in "Taste of Saint Ignatius," the Saint Ignatius College Prep Summer School program for junior high students. With this program now in its 14th year, we are proud to offer a wide array of enjoyable, enriching, and challenging courses for 7th and 8th grade students (as of the Fall 2011).

All academic offerings are outlined in this catalog. There are two three-week academic sessions available. Information on athletic camps can be found online at www.ignatius.org. These courses and camps may be taken individually or together.

Academic course registrations must be postmarked by June 10. Spaces are reserved on a first-come, first-serve basis and are limited.

It is advisable to register for athletic camps as soon as possible, but athletic camp registration will continue until the first day of each particular camp.

Once the summer school staff has received your completed registration form and tuition deposit, we will schedule your classes. **You should retain a copy of your registration form and bring it with you to the summer school orientation.** Session I Orientation for junior high students will take place from 9:00-10:00 a.m. on Friday, June 17 and Session II Orientation will take place from 9:00-10:00 a.m. on Friday, July 8. Students who sign up for classes in both sessions should attend only the Session I Orientation on June 17.

ACADEMIC COURSE DESCRIPTIONS

JH1/JH21: Science Excitement: This lab-based course is designed for junior high students with an interest in science. Taught by a Saint Ignatius science teacher and using our state-of-the-art labs, the course will explore a variety of scientific topics through experimentation.

Class meets 8:00-10:00 a.m. Mark JH1 for June 20–July 8 (Session I) or JH21 for July 11–July 29 (Session II).

JH2/JH22: Language Arts: This course explores the English language, with an emphasis on the principles of grammar, sentence structure, effective paragraph development, essay writing, vocabulary building and critical reading. **Class meets 10:00-12:00 noon. Mark JH2 for June 20–July 8 (Session I) or JH22 for July 11–July 29 (Session II).**

JH3/JH23: Current Events and Geography: This course will examine how geography has influenced current issues such as terrorism, the Arab-Israeli conflict, the war with Iraq, AIDS and economic development in Africa, and the rise of China as an economic power. Students will study the geography of various regions and apply their knowledge to current events.

Class meets 8:00-10:00 a.m. Mark JH3 for June 20–July 8 (Session I) or JH23 for July 11–July 29 (Session II).

JH4/JH24: Mathematics: This course explores mathematical concepts appropriate for junior high students, including fractions, percents, decimals, word problems, and practical mathematical applications. **Class meets 10:00-12:00 noon. Mark JH4 for June 20–July 8 (Session I) or JH24 for July 11–July 29 (Session II).**

JH5/JH25: Classical Mythology: This course begins an exploration of classical mythology that allows students to appreciate the myths as they are used in literature as a way of discovering the important role that mythology plays in the literature and art of our society. **Class meets 8:00-10:00 a.m. Mark JH5 for June 20–July 8 (Session I) or JH25 for July 11–July 29 (Session II).**

JH6/JH26: Technology: This class allows students to learn the basic elements of useful Windows-based programs such as Word, PowerPoint, Excel and Publisher and apply the programs as they create a project of interest to them. **Class meets 10:00-12:00 noon. Mark JH6 for June 20–July 8 (Session I) or JH26 for July 11–July 29 (Session II).**

JH7/JH27: Spanish for Oral Proficiency: This course is designed to introduce students to the basics of Spanish communication and culture while stressing speaking and listening skills. **Class meets 8:00-10:00 a.m. Mark JH7 for June 20–July 8 (Session I) or JH27 for July 11–July 29 (Session II).**

JH8/JH28: Understanding China: Students of the 21st century should have a working knowledge of Chinese history, culture, politics, and economics. Students will explore these topics through readings, research, discussions, and documentaries. **Class meets 10:00-12:00 noon. Mark JH8 for June 20–July 8 (Session I) or JH28 for July 11–July 29 (Session II).**

JH9/JH29: Beginning Percussion: Students will learn the basics of how to play each percussion instrument properly through practice and performance. Students will learn how to read percussion music as well as develop music theory skills, technique, and historical knowledge. **Class meets 8:00-10:00 a.m. Mark JH9 for June 20–July 8 (Session I) or JH29 for July 11–July 29 (Session II).**

JH10/JH30: Beginning Band: This course explores a variety of styles of music for a band instrumental ensemble. Students will advance their music theory skills, playing technique, and appreciation of music, through practice and performance. Students are required to read music and play a band instrument for at least one year. **Class meets 10:00-12:00 noon. Mark JH10 for June 20–July 8 (Session I) or JH30 for July 11–July 29 (Session II).**

JH12/JH32: Art: This three week, hands-on art course will work on developing observational skills while covering sighting techniques, proportion and the formal elements of drawing. The students will work with a variety of materials such as pencil, soft pastel and clay and will focus on landscape, still-life and the human figure as subject matter. **Class meets 10:00 a.m.-noon. Mark JH12 for June 20–July 8 (Session I) or JH32 for July 11–July 29 (Session II).**

ESSENTIAL INFORMATION

Attendance: Full attendance, including Orientation Day, is essential for the successful completion of Summer School. Since all junior high classes are three weeks in length, students are expected to attend class every day. Please avoid signing up for classes on dates that may conflict with vacations and other summer camps.

Tuition: Cost is \$250 for each three-week course or \$450 for any two courses. Half of the total tuition is due with registration. The balance is due no later than June 17.

Transportation: Saint Ignatius does not have summer bus service. However, we will sell reduced-fare student CTA cards and distribute reduced-fare Metra letters. Located next to the University of Illinois-Chicago campus on Roosevelt Road, Saint Ignatius is easily accessible by several CTA bus routes that link the school to downtown train stations and several CTA rail lines. The Eisenhower El (Blue Line) is just a ten-minute walk. By car, the school is within a few minutes of the Ryan, Kennedy, Eisenhower and Stevenson Expressways.

Credit: All junior high courses are non-credit. Taking courses in the Saint Ignatius Summer School in no way constitutes a commitment on the part of Saint Ignatius College Prep to accept a student for admission as a freshman.

Dress: Students' clothing must be neat, clean, and appropriate for school. Modest shorts are allowed. All dress code regulations will be outlined on Orientation Day.

Dates/Class Information: Session I: June 20–July 8 (no classes on July 4). Session II: July 11–July 29. You may choose up to one 8:00 a.m. class and one 10:00 a.m. class for each session.

Vital Information

Attendance

Full attendance is essential. The intensity of coursework demands that students attend class every day without exception. Absences may affect grades.

Tuition

Tuition is \$500 for each half-credit course (60 hours). Tuition for courses which meet for longer or shorter periods of time is pro-rated based on this amount. Refer to course descriptions for the tuition for a particular course. Half of the total tuition is due with registration. **The balance is due no later than June 17.** Limited financial aid may be available. Please contact Mr. Tyrrell for more information.

Transportation

Located next to the University of Illinois-Chicago, Saint Ignatius College Prep is easily accessible by several CTA buses that link the school to the downtown train stations and CTA rail lines. The Eisenhower El (Blue Line) is a ten-minute walk. By car, the school is within a few minutes of the Ryan, Kennedy, Eisenhower, and Stevenson Expressways. Many students find carpools convenient as well.

Credit

Some courses may be taken for credit. Current or new Saint Ignatius students with questions regarding credit should address them with the Director of Summer School. It is the responsibility of any student who is from a high school other than Saint Ignatius to inquire at his or her own school whether a particular course can be accepted for transfer credit.

Orientation Day

Attendance at Summer School Orientation on Friday, June 17 is mandatory for **all** students, regardless of the start date for your class. **The only exceptions are students who are only taking study skills.** Orientation will begin at 10:30 a.m. and conclude around 11:30 a.m.

Freshman Courses (Class of 2015)
High School Readiness Courses
The following courses are open to incoming freshmen only:

College Prep Reading, Grammar and Writing (RGW): This six-week course will enhance the language skills of incoming freshmen, especially in the areas of reading, grammar, punctuation, usage, writing, speaking and vocabulary. The course will include outlining; specialized reading skills and strategies for various disciplines (literature, history, language); and skills pertinent to the study of foreign languages. While the course is open to all freshmen, it is especially recommended for those whose test scores on the STS Entrance Exam indicate that they may need further preparation prior to freshman year. The course is offered as a non-credit course and does not replace the English 1 course during the regular school year. **The Reading, Grammar and Writing class will meet for two-and-a-half hours per day from June 20-July 29. Tuition is \$500. Mark RGW on the Registration Form.**

Introduction to Algebra (IA): This six-week course reviews arithmetic topics, including fractions and decimals. The course also introduces the proper use of the scientific calculator, the use of variables in problem-solving, signed numbers and graphing on a coordinate plane. Additional lessons on note-taking and reading a mathematics textbook are included. The course is open to all freshmen but is especially recommended for those whose test scores on the STS Entrance Exam and Math Placement Exam (on April 17) indicate that they may need further preparation prior to freshman year. These students will be contacted by the Summer School and/or Math Department. The course is offered as a non-credit course and does not replace the Algebra I course during the regular school year. **The Introduction to Algebra class will meet for one-and-a-half hours per day from June 20-July 29. Tuition is \$500. Mark IA on the Registration Form.**

The following course is offered by invitation only from the Math Department:

Algebra I Survey (AS): This six-week course is open by invitation of the Math Department to those incoming freshmen whom the department designates as nearly ready for Geometry Honors but lacking some algebraic skills or understanding. After the Math Placement Exam, students will be notified if they have been selected to take this course. Any student who takes the course must earn a B+ or higher before he or she will be allowed to take Geometry Honors in the freshman year. If a student is notified that he or she may take the course but chooses not to do so, he or she will be placed in Algebra 1 for freshman year. **Students will be invited to take this course based on their scores on the Math Placement Exam, April 2, 2011. The course will meet for two hours per day from June 20-July 29. Tuition is \$500. Mark AS on the Registration Form.**

Study Skills Workshops for All Freshmen

Note: Freshmen enrolled in Study Skills only are NOT required to attend the June 17th Orientation.

This one-week workshop, conducted by the Counseling and Guidance Department of Saint Ignatius, is designed to help good students fine tune their study skills to insure optimum learning. The workshop includes practical ideas for note-taking, time management, memory improvement, writing papers, and building relationships. In addition to the Guidance Counselors, faculty members from the academic departments conduct sessions on how to study effectively for each academic discipline. **Register early for one of two sessions: August 1-5, 8-11 a.m. (Session 1 -- mark SS1 on the Registration Form) or August 8-12, 8-11 a.m. (Session 2 -- mark SS2 on the Registration Form). Tuition is \$200, materials included. Registration deadline for Study Skills is Wednesday, July 27.**

Courses for Freshmen Who Will Be Taking Integrated Science and/or Band/Orchestra/Choir:

The following courses are only open to freshmen who are enrolled in Integrated Science and/or Band/Orchestra/Choir during fall 2011. Freshmen who will be taking Integrated Science and/or Band/Orchestra/Choir are strongly encouraged to take these classes in the summer.

Speech (ESP): This four-week course focuses on developing oral communication skills, research, organization, and oral presentations to inform, persuade and arouse emotion. Outlining, writing, supporting a thesis and critiquing are integral to the course. **This course is offered for ¼-credit as a graduation requirement. Speech classes will meet from 8 a.m.-10 a.m. or 10 a.m.-noon during 2 four week periods: June 20-July 15 and June 27-July 22. Requests for placement in a particular section must be written and will be honored as much as possible on a first-come, first-serve basis. However, enrollment is limited in this course, so students are advised to register early. Tuition is \$300. Mark ESP on the Registration Form.**

Introduction to Technology (IT1/IT2): This three-week, hands-on course focuses on word processing, spreadsheets, Internet research, multimedia presentations, networking basics, and telecommunications. The course provides students with the knowledge and skills necessary to integrate technology in all areas of the curriculum. **This course is offered for ¼-credit as a graduation requirement. Introduction to Technology classes will meet from 8 a.m.-10 a.m. and 10 a.m.-noon from June 20-July 8 (mark IT1 on registration sheet) and again from July 11-July 29 (mark IT2 on the Registration Form). Enrollment is limited in this course, so students are advised to register early. Tuition is \$250.**

Courses for Sophomores, Juniors, and Seniors (Classes of '12-'14)

Speech (ESP): This four-week course focuses on developing oral communication skills, research, organization, and oral presentations to inform, persuade and arouse emotion. Outlining, writing, supporting a thesis and critiquing are integral to the course. **This course is offered for ¼-credit as a graduation requirement. Speech classes will meet from 8 a.m.-10 a.m. or 10 a.m.-noon during 2 four week periods: June 20-July 15 and June 27-July 22. Requests for placement in a particular section must be written and will be honored as much as possible on a first-come, first-serve basis. However, enrollment is limited in this course, so students are advised to register early. Tuition is \$300. Mark ESP on the Registration Form.**

Introduction to Technology (IT1/IT2): This three-week, hands-on course focuses on word processing, spreadsheets, Internet research, multimedia presentations, networking basics, and telecommunications. The course provides students with the knowledge and skills necessary to integrate technology in all areas of the curriculum. **This course is offered for ¼-credit as a graduation requirement. Introduction to Technology classes will meet from 8 a.m.-10 a.m. and 10 a.m.-noon from June 20-July 8 (mark IT1 on registration sheet) and again from July 11-July 29 (mark IT2 on the Registration Form). Enrollment is limited in this course, so students are advised to register early. Tuition is \$250.**

Desktop Publishing-Independent Study (DP): This three-week, hands-on course focuses on the design and production of desktop publishing projects. **This course is offered for ¼-credit and does fulfill the graduation requirement for those students who tested out of Introduction to Technology. It will meet for two hours a day from July 11-July 29. Mark DP on the registration form. Enrollment is limited to five students, so students are advised to register early. Tuition is \$250.**

English 1 (E1): *Freshman English:* In this six-week course, students develop the critical skills necessary to appreciate and evaluate the works of authors from around the world. Students will analyze, discuss, research and write critical papers. The elements of critical writing will be the focus of the class. The course is open to students who need to remediate a failing grade in English 1 (for credit) or who seek to improve their writing prior to Sophomore English (non-credit option). **No member of the Class of 2015 is allowed to take this course. The English 1 class will meet for two hours per day from June 20-July 29. Tuition is \$500. Mark E1 on the Registration Form.**

English 2 (E2): *Sophomore English:* In this six-week course, students will develop their ability to read and write cogently as they study American Literature. The connection between history and literature will be emphasized. Students will study periods and movements in American literature; trace themes and archetypes of the American identity; articulate the effects of ethnic diversity and gender relations on American literature; expand their vocabulary in writing, reading, and speech; and conduct research. The course is open to students who need to remediate a failing grade in English 2 (for credit) or who seek to improve their writing and knowledge of American Literature prior to Junior English (non-credit option). **The English 2 class will meet for two hours per day from June 20-July 29. Tuition is \$500. Mark E2 on the Registration Form.**

English 3 (E3): *Junior English:* In this six-week course, students will focus on the research paper and British literature. They will respond thoughtfully and coherently to British literature through creative writing, reader response activities and textual criticism. They will be expected to know and apply rules and standards of grammar, usage, and spelling, and their writing will demonstrate an ability to develop a thesis and organize and compose ideas. A central component of the course will be a major research paper. The course is open to students who need to remediate a failing grade in English 3 (for credit) or who seek to improve their research writing prior to Senior English (non-credit option). **The English 3 class will meet for two hours per day from June 20-July 29. Tuition is \$500. Mark E3 on the Registration Form.**

Integrated Science I Prep Course (IS): This four-week course is intended as a non-credit, non-graded option for students who are looking to prepare for IS1 or who would like to review key topics before remediating an IS1 course failure. We will focus on graphing, solving physics problems, Newton's Laws of Motion, atomic structure, chemical equations and stoichiometry, and cell biology. We will perform IS1 labs and review the calculations for them. **The Integrated Science I Prep Course will meet for three hours per day from June 20-July 15. Tuition is \$500. Mark IS on the Registration Form.**

Spanish 1 (SP1): This three-week course is intended as a non-credit, non-graded option for students who have passed their Spanish 1 class with a C- or below and who need to strengthen their foundation before continuing to the next level **or** as a ½-credit requirement for students who have failed Spanish 1. The course will focus on all language skills with an emphasis on the grammar and vocabulary introduced in Spanish 1. **The course will meet for four hours per day from June 20-July 8. Tuition is \$500. Mark SP1 on the Registration Form.**

Spanish 2 (SP2): This three-week course is intended as a non-credit, non-graded option for students who have passed their Spanish 2 class with a C- or below and who need to strengthen their foundation before continuing to the next level **or** as a ½-credit requirement for students who have failed Spanish 2. The course will focus on all language skills with an emphasis on the grammar and vocabulary introduced in Spanish 2 **The course will meet for four hours per day from June 20-July 8. Tuition is \$500. Mark SP2 on the Registration Form.**

Latin 1 (LT1): This six-week course is intended as a non-credit, non-graded option for students who have passed their Latin 1 class with a C- or below and who need to strengthen their foundation before continuing to the next level **or** as a ½-credit requirement for students who have failed Latin 1. The course will focus on all language skills with an emphasis on the grammar and vocabulary introduced in Latin 1. **The course will meet two hours per day from June 20-July 29. Tuition is \$500. Mark LT1 on the Registration Form.**

Latin 2 (LT2): This six-week course is intended as a non-credit, non-graded option for students who have passed their Latin 2 class with a C- or below and who need to strengthen their foundation before continuing to the next level **or** as a ½-credit requirement for students who have failed Latin 2. The course will focus on all language skills with an emphasis on the grammar and vocabulary introduced in Latin 2. **The course will meet two hours per day from June 20-July 29. Tuition is \$500. Mark LT2 on the Registration Form.**

World History (WH): This three-week course is intended as a non-credit, non-graded option for students who have passed their World History class with a C- or below and who need to strengthen their foundation before continuing to the next level **or** as a ½-credit requirement for students who have failed World History. There will be a strong emphasis on building good study habits and carefully and effectively reading a history text. The instructor will place emphasis on information from the different semesters, depending on the needs of the individual student. **The course will meet for four hours per day from June 20-July 8. Tuition is \$500. Mark WH on the Registration Form.**

United States History (US): This three-week course is intended as a non-credit, non-graded option for students who have passed their U.S. History class with a C- or below and who need to strengthen their foundation before continuing to the next level **or** as a ½-credit requirement for students who have failed U.S. History. There will be a strong emphasis on building good study habits and carefully and effectively reading a history text. The instructor will place emphasis on information from the different semesters, depending on the needs of the individual student. **The course will meet for four hours per day from June 20-July 8. Tuition is \$500. Mark US on the Registration Form.**

Mythology (MY): The course consists of a survey of classical myth that introduces its major characters and categories. The primary goals of the course are: 1) to learn what classical mythology is and how it reflects classical Roman and Greek culture; 2) to read critically and appreciate the myths as they are used in literature; 3) to articulate that critical reading and appreciation orally and in writing; and 4) to acquire a literacy in classical mythology, its richness and diversity, and its importance for Western literature, art, and philosophy. **The course will meet two hours per day from June 20-July 29. Tuition is \$500. Mark MY on the Registration Form.**

Course offerings may change without notice. In the event that the Summer School is unable to enroll you in a course for which you register, we will attempt to notify you in as timely a manner as possible.
